Twenty Rescued from Ice Floe

The U.S. Coast Guard will enforce the safety zone on the lake during the winter months to protect those who use the waterways from hazards.

The U.S. Coast Guard began enforcing the regulation of a safety zone around the islands in Lake Erie on Wednesday, January 24th, at 8 a.m. for winter weather hazards.

The protocol is intended to protect those who use the waterway during the winter months from hazards associated with winter weather and navigation, according



to the Coast Guard.

The west boundary extends to Port Clinton, the south boundary extends to near Huron, and the north boundary extends to the U.S.-Canada border in the lake itself. - Credit: US Coast Guard

Isle St. George, Middle Bass Island, Put-in-Bay, Kelleys Island, Catawba Island, Lakeside Marblehead and the Sandusky Bay are covered in the safety zone.

Any vessels that entered the zone after enforcement began were required to contract Sector Detroit at (313) 568-9560 to request permission to enter the zone. The request must be made 72 hours in advance, the Coast Guard said. On Monday, January 22nd, the Coast Guard rescued nine people and four people were rescued by the Put-in-Bay Fire Department from an ice floe about a half mile off Catawba Island. Seven people were able to self-rescue via their own airboat. A total of 20 people were rescued from the ice floe. At first, some individuals may have been unaware that they were on a drifting ice floe.

At 10:21 a.m. Coast Guard and local authorities responded to an initial report of more than 20 people on an ice floe a half mile off shore near Catawba Island. Coast Guard crews from Station Marblehead and Air Station Detroit responded in conjunction with the Put-in-Bay Fire Department and Ottawa County Sheriff's Office. In total, there were five rescue assets on scene: 1 Helicopter, 1 Sherp ATV and 3 Airboats. Stranded individuals were either ferried to Catawba Island State Park, or flown to the airport. There were no injuries reported.

"We are committed to public safety and want to remind everyone the importance of exercising caution around ice formations," said Lt. Adeeb Ahmad, Sector Detroit Public Affairs Officer. "Ice floes are unpredictable and can quickly become hazardous, particularly in windy conditions or strong currents. Always check local ice conditions before venturing out and be prepared for any emergencies. Your safety is our top priority."

I am the daughter of Christie Ontko and Eric Engel, and granddaughter of Linda Parker and Charlie (Tuna) Ontko. I grew up hearing a scattering of stories about

great-grandma Elizabeth with a lamppost on the dock where she worked, and a plaque that tells passers-by who she was, what she did and why she matters.

Elizabeth Kuemmel was the first student from Middle Bass to complete a year at Put-in-Bay School and graduated in 1931 with a class size of five. As many may know, Elizabeth married South Bass Islander, Alfred Parker, and together they ran the Parker Boat Line. Elizabeth ran the office and marina docks, doing all the book and record keeping, managed the freight and vehicle reservations, and made countless calls on the phone and transmissions over the radiotelephone. She also worked on the docks in a very physical capacity; Elizabeth loaded freight, gassed boats, caught lines for the incoming ferries and seasonal boaters.

Elizabeth's devotion to Parker Boat Line is admirable by any modern business owner's standards. Staying late at the office and into the night was her norm. So much so, she kept a cot for sleeping overnight when the work piled too high to leave. A testament to these late nights, I grew up hearing a unique boating navigation cue. When the fall comes and the buoys are removed from the harbor, boaters have to know when to turn the channel corner by Gibraltar Island. In the days of Parker Boat Line, boaters looked for "the light of Elizabeth's office," for knowing when to make the turn. Where the "light of Elizabeth's office" once was, the Jet Express Dock now exists. Today, the old adage is still passed down to generations who never actually saw this light - passed down to young boaters like me.

My great-grandmother died long before I was born. Elizabeth (Kuemmel) Parker passed in September of 1976. Her husband, my great-grandfather Alfred, lived until 1986. Following his death, a park was dedicated in his name on the West Shore. Today, there is no testament to my greatgrandmother on the island. We have the power to change that. It's important to me that a memorial

to Elizabeth be built and placed in plain sight. Her story deserves to be told. I fear that if there is no memorial to her life and the contributions she made to our island community, she will be forgotten.

I believe in the importance of promoting all the amazing things that women have accomplished and that it's time for the women in history to be properly recognized. When I was the only woman working on the Miller Ferry, not a single day passed without someone telling me how inspired they were seeing a female deckhand. It was an amazing feeling, to make



a difference. I can only hope a memorial to Elizabeth, another woman who worked in the maritime industry, would have a similar impact.

The funds from this fundraiser will be used to build a memorial dedicated to Elizabeth Parker near the Jet Express Dock on Put-in-Bay, which includes a lamppost and bronze plaque and all of the associated electrical and construction costs. The memorial is expected to be completed in 2024 with the help of the Blumensaadt and Duggan families so that "the light of Elizabeth's office" may shine on forever. My wish is that we not only raise money for a memorial, but that we bring back old memories of my great-grandmother and all who dedicated their time to Parker Boat Line and the Great Lakes maritime industry.

Mon., Jan. 8th - This is the last day of ferry service for the season as freezing and windy weather is about to descend on the islands on Tuesday.

Tue., Jan. 9th - There's no quorum for the Village Council meeting and it is postponed until Thursday. Wed., Jan. 10th - For those who want to try something new, the library has a Zentangle Coloring for island adults to soothe their minds. The movie at the PIB Yacht Club is "The Swan Princess."

Thu., Jan. 11th - Village Council votes to purchase a new Dodge Charger for the police department for \$34,283.50, plus equip it for \$15,128.10. Council also voted to hire Brian Cultice to be the IT consultant for the Village. On this date in 1942, Lonz Winery on Middle Bass Island burned to the ground. 

Fri., Jan. 19th - In spite of the ice on the lake around the islands, the ice cover for Lake Erie is about half the 50-year average for this date. The long term weather forecast calls for a warm up during the last week of January. Ice shanties are appearing off the West Shore. The Panther Basketball Team hosts an island scrimmage at the school in the evening featuring a halftime performance by the Cheer Camp kids. Superintendent Mangas drains a three pointer at the buzzer before halftime to give the islander team the lead.

Sat., Jan. 20th - The beautiful day starts bright and sunny after a fresh coat of snow overnight and temperatures in the high single digits. Ryan Stoiber catches a very nice 28-inch walleye. The first drawing of the yacht club's rolling raffle takes place. Marcia Ashley and Jason Cooper draw Anna-Katrin Hildebrant's ticket. You can still buy your tickets at the club or online at PIBYC.ORG under Event and Fundraisers. The EMT students hold a competition today to see if the girls or guys can reassemble a model of the human anatomy the fastest.

Sun., Jan. 21st - The Forge is delivering snacks and beer for ice fishermen to the ice ramp on the West Shore. Barry Koehler builds a bonfire on the ice in the harbor and soon there's an ice party. Michele Heineman and Lisa and Bill Kehoe ride their ATVs from PIB to Middle Bass where they stop in front of Lonz Winery for a photo opportunity. Fr. Bob Solon, while wearing jaktrax, slips and falls at Topsy Turvey and breaks his leg and ankle. Get well soon, Bob!

Mon., Jan. 22nd - The normal daily high temperature for this date is 31 degrees and the low is 20, but today's actual high and low are 25 and 14. There's an ice rescue of 20 fishermen off the Catawba State Park who are caught on an ice floe. Along with the Coast Guard and mainland agencies, the PIB Vol. Fire Dept. comes to rescue with its airboat.

Tue., Jan. 23rd - And so it begins...above freezing temperatures and rain predicted for the next few days. Not good for the ice! As he flies over, Dustin Shaffer from Island Air Taxi spots the leftover quads, shanties and a snowmobile that were left on the ice after from yesterday's ice floe rescue...then

the fog rolls in and flights stop. Put-in-Bay School cancels classes for the day and the Put-in-Bay Township Office closes due to icy weather conditions.

Wed., Jan. 24th - The thick fog and slippery roads didn't stop the parent/teacher conferences at PIB School. Island parents apparently went into the conferences in a fog and left in one, too. The kids had the day off...again.

Thu., Jan. 25th - It's the second day of fog. Movement of people and freight between the mainland and the islands is on hold. It reminds us of the old days waiting at the airport for the fog to lift so you could get on or off the island. Island Air Taxi pilot Dustin Shaffer says he doesn't have the foggiest idea of when the fog will clear and he will be able to begin flying.

Fri., Jan. 26th - It's the third day of thick fog. If you've got cabin fever being stuck on the island like this, you're probably not cut out for island life. Ma Werty says she remembers being stranded on the mainland once trying to get to PIB for five days due to fog. Members of the PIBVFD, Nate Jones, Doug Wilhelm and Bree Reynolds, run to the mainland on the department's airboat to get Larry Knaser his medication for his infection. He had run out of medication due to no planes since Tuesday morning

Sat., Jan. 27th - It's still foggy and no flights, but Rescue Marine's tugboat "Charlotte Marie" arrives at the Lime Kiln Dock to shuttle a few lucky passengers to the mainland. At Heineman Winery, Dustin is fine tuning the next batch of Pink Catawba. Barry Koehler is exploring Buckeye Island and reports the shove ice piles are at least 15 feet high!

Sun., Jan. 28th - There's still fog, and no planes are flying. This is now 5 ½ days of fog and low visibility. Services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church are cancelled as Fr. Bob is still stuck on the mainland after breaking his leg earlier in the week.

Mon., Jan. 29th - Eureka! The fog has finally lifted and planes can be heard fly-

ing to and from the island as soon as day breaks. It is estimated that 100 fishermen were stuck on the island for the 6-day fog event. It is a mad dash to get freight and mail to the island with over 600 packages waiting to be flown over. A US Coast Guard Helicopter from Detroit makes a quick stop at the Put-in-Bay Airport in the afternoon.

Tue., Jan. 30th - The new Village website is launched, check it out at villageofpib.com.

Wed., Jan. 31st - Heavy fog has descended upon the island once again and flights are delayed throughout the morning and afternoon. Aaron "Vern" Schroeder has the roof torn off the main house at the tonehenge property. Put-in-Bay racm Club ends the month with a bowl of potato soup as the soup of the week.

Island PHoto Op: GLIA, Loving Island Life By Peter Huston



I have to admit I really love living on an island. Not just part time, but all four seasons. I'm looking for someone who loves island life as much as I do to work for the Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA) part time. Are you this person?!

Before I came to Put-in-Bay, I lived for a decade in the Vermont mountains near Sugarbush Ski Resort. Like the islands, it's a desirable destination with a short season. I like the mountains. In mountains and islands, tourism can provide jobs and commerce for a community, but living year round on South Bass I have learned about the many island intangibles, like islander resilience and self-reliance. "Get' Er Done. Making it work. I love island life.

As part of my job with GLIA over the past three years I have visited 15 of our 20 year-round GLIA member islands in the great lakes observing and comparing island communities.

For most of the islands that I have visited, tourism and service industry jobs are the economic engine that employs island residents and countless summer workers. It has become the way to ensure sustainable-year round employment.

I have to admit I really love living on an island. Not just part time, but all four seasons. I'm looking for someone who loves island life as much as I do to work for the Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA) part time. Perhaps you're that person. When I moved to Put-in-Bay from Vermont in 2005, I had been living near a ski resort called Sugarbush for 10 years. It's desirable winter destination status and short visitation season are much like Put-in-Bay. It is similar, but not the same. I like the mountains, I love island life.

As part of my job with GLIA over the past three years I have visited 15 of our 20 year round GLIA member islands in the great lakes observing and comparing island communities. For most of the islands that I have visited, tourism is the economic engine that employees island residents and countless summer workers. It has become the way to ensure sustainable year round living on South Bass Island. Knowing some background about island life would be very helpful.

Tourism may provide jobs and commerce for our (island) community, but after living year round on South Bass full time since 2006 I have learned about the many intangible things that make island living special and fun year round. I have learned so much about islander resilience and self reliance.

When I first arrived in Put-in-Bay, I was fortunate to be a tour train driver employed by the Duggan family. It afforded me the opportunity to learn local history, share it with visitors and get a deeper sense of what makes the Bass Islands truly unique. It also primed me for learning how other islands work.

If you have a keen Interest in learning about "island community" and being a conduit of information, this may be a great job for you. My five years as Chamber director connected me to local governance, problem solving, and often unseen management of the island. Someone observed, "no person is an island to themselves." GLIA's mission is to be a conduit of information for our island partners. Sharing challenges and successes, solutions unique to islands. This best describes what GLIA does.

The Great Lakes Islands Alliance, or GLIA, is a voluntary, collaborative network of islanders from 20 islands around the Great Lakes. Since 2018, the mission of GLIA is to "encourage relationship building, foster information exchange, and leverage resources to address shared challenges and embrace opportunities to benefit islands." We've found that island communities have much in common, despite the differences in size, history, culture, and geography. GLIA shares local experiences across a wide range of topics, including environmental protection, transportation, tourism, housing, emergency services, island schools, infrastructure, and more. Importantly, we seek solutions and look to the future. Membership of GLIA is free and open to any islander, both year-round and seasonal. Existing members wear many hats, including local government, boards and commissions, non-profits, schools, Chambers of Commerce, businesses, property owner associations, island media and retirees. GLIA convenes once monthly via zoom and annually in-person at our Islands Summit (our next Summit will be Sept. 22-25, 2024 in Hessel/Cedarville, MI, home of the Les Cheneaux Islands in northern Lake Huron). GLIA needs a person who enjoys these challenges and wants to get involved. In 2016 when Matt Preisser and Jon Allan (organizers of GLIA) walked into the chamber office with a handshake and an idea to form GLIA it was a transformative moment for me, an aha moment. GLIA needs a communications person and a fundraising specialist who are interested in being a part of this great organization. Anyone is welcome to apply, you don't need to be an islander, you don't even have to live year round (although it is the perfect winter work from home job, but you need to have experienced and embrace the joy of island life and understand the challenges and the many wonderful benefits it can provide. Contact Brian at the Gazette to get the job descriptions. Don't want a job, but want to join? Membership of GLIA is free and open to any islander, both year-round and seasonal. Existing members wear many hats, including local government officials, boards and committees, non-profits, schools, Chambers of Commerce, businesses, property owner associations, island media and retirees. Listen to Larry By Larry Schrader

News, Views and Comments from a South Bass Cottager...

In last month's column, I suggested that the continued pace of Global Warming could make cottage life here on the Bass Islands a year-round affair. As it is turning out, our Winter of 2023-24 offers further evidence of this trend toward warmer weather. The thermometer rarely dropped below thirty in December – it was almost 60-degrees on Christmas Day! And, although a January freeze arrived with enough ice to bring out the fishing shanties, it barely lasted a week.

After last month's column was published, I received a letter from a Gazette reader, a West Shore cottager, and an avid fan of "Listen to Larry." He included a column he had

clipped from his local newspaper. Believe it or not, Global Warming has already had an impact on another, mostly unexpected industry – researchers, farmers, and brewers are already working to safeguard beer production from the effects of climate change. Here, the home of Ohio's oldest winery, a place where Margaritas and Mojitos, and more than a few beers are routinely consumed by our fun-loving Summer visitors, problems in the brewing industry could spell disaster for Put-in-Bay! In fact, I'm told that beer is also a popular refreshment of many cottagers as well. What in the world is going on?

In the newspaper article, reporters Melina Walling, Amanda Loman, and Brooke Herbert of the Associated Press report that two key components of beer production, hops and barley, are already being challenged by climate change. For those not familiar with the brewing process, hops help to keep beer fresher, longer; promote a healthy head of foam; and most importantly, are a key component of a beer's aroma and flavor – the "spice" of beer. Hops are a green, cone-shaped flower of the female hop plant, Humulus Lupulus. Barley is the preferred source of fermentable sugars that yeast feed on to produce alcohol, essential to brewing and a key component of the characteristic color and taste of beer. Without hops and barley, we will have no beer, at least not a beer with the flavor and feel we have come to love.

Crop yields, both in Europe and the United States are down as much as twenty percent because of extreme heat, drought, and unpredictable growing seasons. Researchers are developing improved plant variants to stand up to the terrors of climate change but retain the taste profiles of the traditional crops. And of course, there is always a need for fresh water, both for the crops and to make the beer itself! Indeed, these key components of a beloved beverage face a very real threat.

So where does our little island fit into this puzzle? Well, we are certainly blessed with an abundance of fresh water. Our climate, tempered by the warm waters of the lake, has been the perfect place for growing grapes since Gustav Heineman first put a shovel in the ground way back in 1888! Why not add hops and barley to the mix?

As I peddle my bike around the Island, there seems to be plenty of available acreage, and we have open land on Middle Bass and North Bass as well. Sturdy, more weather resistant crops in late-Autumn and early-Spring will offer new job opportunities for seasonal workers usually left idle after the tourist season ends. We also have an ample supply of senior citizens that can use some extra income as well – planting, harvesting, working the land! Abundant crops of hops and barley can provide a valuable new source of income for Islanders and cottagers, a new income stream, tax revenue too!

Don't wait until it is too late, spring to action now – we can't afford to dally until there is no beer! I have already told Mrs. Larry to say goodbye to her cute, little flower garden by our cottage – I'm planting hops!

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



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Sea State

The Sea State report is paused until the Spring of 2024. **25¢ COULD HAVE SAVED**

\$25,000 of Your Tax Dollars!

On the morning of January 22nd, 2024, the rescue (SAR) alarm sounded at Coast Guard Station Marblehead. Coast Guard members from STA Marblehead along with a Coast Guard helicopter flown in from Detroit and multiple local law enforcement agencies responded to 20 fishermen stranded on an ice floe near Catawba Island. Luckily all were safely rescued. While figures are difficult to quantify, the Helo operation alone could have hit that figure, let alone the cost of the air boats, plus the tab paid by local law enforcement. The Coast Guard spends \$680 million a year on search and rescue missions.

Each year we publish our annual ice fishing addition before the ice fishing season begins. In it, we cover the ins and outs and the dos and don'ts including how to gauge ice safety. The cost of the Gazette ... 25¢, I guess they didn't read it.

Put-in-Bay Maritime Academy (Part 3)

For the final part of our Put-in-Bay Maritime Academy class for this off-season, we are going to discuss the importance of charts while navigating the waters around PIB. The importance of having and knowing how to read area nautical charts can't be understated. As every island resident knows, the waters around our area of the western basin are shallow. With that comes additional boating risks that you are less likely to encounter when boating near Cleveland or even Toledo (for example). If you are not totally familiar with the area that you are boating in, the only way to know of various hazards is by consulting nautical charts and/or talking with a well-seasoned mariner that knows our waters. Both methods are important. There continues to be a lot of new boaters in our waters. LEARN YOUR CHARTS! The following are my personal navigation procedures as it relates to charts. I divide my

trips into three categories:

- 1) Very Familiar
- 2) Moderately Familiar
- 3) Not Familiar

In the Very Familiar category I rarely consult my paper charts. These are courses that I have navigated for years. These are also heavily travel waters by other mariners, and I stay alert for navigation bulletins in the event that a hazard alert is issued for these waters. In this case I rely on my GPS and visual points of reference to stay on course and to stay safe.

Lake Erie Islands **Christmas Bird Count**

The Lake Erie Islands Count Circle of the 123rd annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count was held on December 17th, 2023 with people participating on Middle Bass, South Bass, Kelleys and Pelee Island. This is one of the oldest citizen science efforts around-and a fun tradition to get out and enjoy our islands wild places in a quieter time of year! Thanks to all who helped out and those property owners who allowed us access for the day

The day started out with rain and with an open lake, ducks had not congregated in large numbers that day. Total for all four islands together was a respectable 81 species and 8,780 individual birds counted. Good diversity but lower numbers this year.

Here on South Bass Island, we counted 1,309 birds of 40 different species from dawn to dusk. Lisa Brohl, Emily Beal, Elizabeth Heineman, Julene Market, drove and walked around the island to tally waterfowl and land birds. The most numerous bird unfortunately was the House of English Sparrow at 227, showing up in large numbers at feeders and a large group at Heineman's vineyards. These non native birds take over nesting habitat from cavity nesting birds like Eastern bluebirds, purple martins and tree sparrows.

Second most numerous were waterfowl-with 216 Canada Geese-another species that has adapted well to man made environments-like the large lawns along the Put-in-Bay waterfront and at Perry's Victory. There were still bufflehead, red-breasted mergansers, mallards, and a few goldeneyes found that day but not in the numbers they had been even a few days. Three double crested cormorants were still present in the Bay. Five bald eagles were seen-will be interesting to see how many nests this year? Reports of nesting activity in three places on island so far. Count week birds were a sharp-shinned hawk at the feeders of Carmen Trisler and Jim O'Donnell. Marsha Parker had been reporting tundra swans before the count but they were not present count day. Dino Uszak called with swans behind the monument during the count week period so Elizabeth and Lisa met him there for photos.

Russ Brohl, Kit Knaser, Ruth Scarpelli, Michelle Heinemen, Carmen Trisler, Sarah Toole, Maryann, Anita, and Elizabeth McCann, Susan Ferguson, Walt Duff, Gay Pippert, Randi Wertenbach, and Kristin Stanford each watched their feeders and yards that day to record the birds and woodpeckers who came to visit. The best feeder birds was a winter wren

seen by Carmen Trisler at her feeders and the tufted titmice seen at the feeders of Kit Knaser and Kristin Stanford. We were noticeably short on sparrows except house sparrows and a few white-throated sparrows out in the field.

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In Moderately Familiar waters I will consult my charts the day before the trip. For example, I travel to Learnington twice a year and have done so for several years. These waters are moderately familiar to me, but twice a year is not frequent enough to skip charting my trip in my opinion. While I am confident of my route to Learnington I still need to review the waters adjacent to the route for depth and hazards. I will also have the course programmed into my GPS. In the case of Learnington I bring a copy of the Learnington Marina so when I'm given a docking assignment I know exactly where to go. In actuality I have already familiarized myself with the Learnington Marina dockage diagram the day before the trip along with reviewing the nautical charts. You don't want to be floating outside the marina's breakwall trying to figure this thing out.

Trips that you have not made before on your vessel should be considered to be in Not Familiar waters regardless of the distance. The day before such a trip (if not earlier), I will methodically chart the course using my nautical charts and also program the course into my GPS. I will also locate what I call emergency ports of call if an unexpected event should occur before we reach our destination such as bad weather or engine problems. Using your charts for each of these is essential to safe boating. To embark on such a long trip in unfamiliar waters on a whim without first charting are both rookie and hazardous.

What I have tried to do in this article is offer one strategy relating to the appropriate time to use nautical charts. There may be other appropriate strategies. It could be argued that anytime you are navigating the lake you should consult your charts, but in reality for routine trips who's going to do that?

An additional consideration is to always carry paper charts with you while underway.

Remember, GPSs can and do fail, and if you travel in Canadian waters, you are required to have charts on board in accordance with the Canadian Shipping Act-2001 as I understand .

What we were not looking to do in this article was to explain the different features contained on nautical charts which requires study in depth. Nevertheless, I strongly encourage you to seek nautical chart training. There are many online courses that provide this. In fact, right now would be a great time to take such a course online in advance of the PIB boating season. Please think about and consider doing this.

While on the subject of boating classes please plan on participating in one of the US-

CG-AUX safe boating programs to be offered throughout the 2024 boating season. If you are new to boating, what you learn could save your life or that of someone else.

On Middle Bass, Teddi Keith Morris walked and drove the island and watched her feeder all on her own to tally a total of 315 birds of 23 different species with the most numerous birds being European Starlings

with 75. She found common mergansers as well as song sparrows missed on South Bass.

Pelee Island got the only northern shovelers, hooded mergansers, snow goose, wild turkeys, ring-necked pheasant, northern harrier and rough-legged hawk, eastern towhee hairy woodpecker and most of the blue herons for the count-thanks to all the field, forest, and wetland habitat and eagle eye observers 3621 birds of 54 species were counted. Pelee's most numerous birds were 2200 starlings outnumbering the waterfowlusually the highest numbers on the island. The observers at Kelleys were the only ones to find surf scoter, white-winged scoter, black duck, 14 common loons, killdeer, gray catbird, merlin, fox sparrow, white-crowned sparrow, ruby crowned kinglets, brown-headed cowbird, rusty blackbird, redwinged blackbirds, and yellow-rumped warblers-all good birds to see this time of year. At Kelleys, the most numerous bird was the red-breasted mergansers at 618 with a total of 67 species and total number of 3537 birds counted . Participants were John Pogacnik, Tom and Paula Bartlett, Tyler McClain, Mariah Sherer, Sean Williams, and Chris Ashley.

The numbers of great blue heron, fox sparrows, and pied-billed grebes were records for the Lake Erie Islands Count Circle. The numbers of tufted titmouse, ruby-crowned kinglets, merlin, yellow-bellied sapsucker, redheaded woodpecker, and belted kingfisher, were ties to previous records.


