

# A Monumental Eclipse - April 8th, 2024



Don't forget to pick up your pair of limited edition eclipse glasses from the Miller Express dock on April 8th. These are sure to be Put-in-Bay collector's items!

On Monday, April 8th, a total eclipse of the sun will darken the Lake Erie Islands for about 3 minutes and 30 seconds shortly after 3 p.m. The Monumental Eclipse is a celestial marvel that rarely happens, and if you don't get to see this one, you'll have to wait until 2045 for another one in America. The last total solar eclipse visible in Ohio was in 1806. The next total solar eclipse in Ohio will be in the year 2099. The moon's total blocking of the sun promises a unique midday twilight, by casting its shadow over our island, creating a mystical moment of beauty and wonder.

Everyone is invited to come to Put-in-Bay and witness the eclipse on the lawn at Perry's Monument, the perfect backdrop for the viewing. This indeed will be a once-in-a-lifetime unforgettable day where the sky darkens midday, creating a dusk-like ambiance, and witness the spectacular sight of the eclipse in total totality, a rare and awe-inspiring experience for all ages.

The eclipse also promises to be not only a breathtaking experience, but also an educational opportunity. Learn about the science behind solar eclipses, the history of eclipse observations, and their cultural significance across civilizations.

To ensure your eye safety and give you a clear and safe viewing experience, complimentary eclipse viewing glasses will be available. There will also be commemorative merchandise with special eclipse posters and stickers. These commemorative items will be available for purchase at the event and the visitor's center. case you have an emergency; 7) Protect your property from looters who will be using the dark to their advantage; 8) Have candles and matches on hand; 9) Make sure your will is in order at least a week in advance; 9) Don't trust anyone passing out bottled water for free; and 10) Don't applaud until the eclipse is over.

The biggest things to remember: Be Resourceful. If you find yourself panicking as the sun darkens the moon, don't panic. Just be ready for absolutely anything to happen and hopefully nothing out of the ordinary will. And last, but not least, have fun! This is a once in a lifetime thing! But if you are not fortunate enough to be on the islands for the eclipse, next time you're on the island, go down in Perry's Cave and ask them to turn out the lights for about three minutes. It's a similar experience.

#### **Eclipse Protesters**

Two separate groups of "anthelions" have been posting on social media that one of them will be holding a protest march and the other a sit-in on Monday, April 8th, at Put-in-Bay. Apparently, both groups are against anything to do with the solar eclipse that islanders will be experiencing that day.

The protest march group will be free to demonstrate, but will be confined to the parking lot behind the town hall. The other group, those who want to sit-in rather than march, will gather at the ball diamond on Concord Ave. In case of rain, the protestors will gather in the school gym and the sitter-inners will go upstairs in the town hall where there are plenty of chairs. Both the village police and sheriff officers on the island will be reinforced with additional officers who will come from the mainland to make sure everything is safe and without violence. Deputy Jeremy Arnold told island officials he does not agree with the anthelions, so he has only called for regular sheriff deputies from around the area and not the SWAT teams that were called to the island to handle the situation that got out of hand last July. "These are not violent people, only misguided," he told the Gazette reporter. Storm, the sheriff's new police dog, will also be on hand to help with crowd control and howl at the moon as it totally blocks the sun. The other reason security is being beefed up is to guard against migrants sneaking across the border from Canada under the cover of eclipse darkness.

Many island businesses will be open, so there will be plenty to do and see before and after the eclipse. Plan now to be at Put-in-Bay for the eclipse.

#### Dealing with the Eclipse By Anony Muncule

Due to circumstances out of our control, there will be a full solar eclipse that will darken the island on Monday, April 8th. We thought it prudent to put out some tidbits to help get you through it safely.

It's hard to predict what might happen that weekend and the day of. The islands are expecting a huge surge in people visiting the area. The biggest issues we see coming from this are: 1) Traffic congestion with hundreds of golf carts on our streets and roads; 2) The possibility of cell phone and internet degradation as towers and fiber optic cables offload some users; 3) Lack of traffic control and drinking water for the hordes expected to be on the islands; 4) Cloud cover obscuring the sighting causing people to riot; 5) Fishermen not using their running lights during the eclipse; and 6) Visitors driving golf carts and forgetting to take their dark glasses off after viewing the phenomenon and causing accidents.

We highly recommend not using face time for your cell phone calls. It will be dark and you won't see anything. Using text messages to communicate during the darkness is encouraged, but not mandatory. When taking photos of the eclipse, use your flash option. Your photos will come out much better. We also suggest you have a powerful flashlight and extra batteries. Running into a stranger in the dark can be terrifying.

Here are some other things to keep in mind for the eclipse: 1) Top off the gas tank in your car or golf cart; 2) Top off extra gas cans, too; 3) Make sure your pantry is full and you have plenty of pet food; 4) Keep all pets inside; 5) Make sure you have at least a week's supply of any prescription medications and hearing aid batteries; 6) Memorize 911 in

The protest and sit-in will last about 3 minutes and 18 seconds, the same as the total eclipse lasts, but then again who's counting?

In a random nationwide phone poll interview with those likely to be coming to PIB for the eclipse, only 3% said the sit-in and protest would keep them from coming to PIB to view the once-in-a-lifetime event. And 100% of that 3% also mentioned that being afraid of the dark will factor into their final decision.

Chamber of Commerce director Windy Chambers was happy to announce that the other eclipse events will go on as scheduled and not be canceled due to the anthelions protest marching and sitting in. She added PIB welcomes normal people to the island to see the sun blocking the moon and hopes they will incorporate eclipse myths into their own celebrations of the celestial wonders on April 8th.

And lastly, Neuman Boat Line is also offering a special ticket price to those protesters who come over on the 6 a.m. ferry from Marblehead. They will be able to purchase two one-way, round-trip tickets for the price of three.



# LEIC Native Plant Sale The Lake Erie Islands Conservancy (LEIC) are taking orders for native plants and trees

for the islands. We are using Natives in Harmony and Riverside Native Perennials for our native plant sale as well as plants grown from Middle Bass seed by Chad Machinski. We are also offering trees from Riverside Native Trees, QRST Trees, and Thin Place Native Trees. Buying and planting natives is a great way to provide quality habitat for the birds, butterflies, moths and other wildlife on the islands. We are promoting the planting of native trees and shrubs because our wildlife are adapted to feeding on these plants and using them for shelter. This fundraiser will be used to support the LEIC land preservation and restoration programs!

Plants: LEIC is selling varieties of native perennial plants and flowers from Natives in Harmony from Marengo, Ohio and Chad Machinski. You can use the order form provided for the list of native plant plugs. You can order ahead to make sure you get what you want or we will have them for sale locally at our events in spring.

Trees: Use the order form for trees and inquire about those larger size trees.

New this year are native perennials in larger sizes through Riverside Native Perennials. You can order these by using this website https://riversidenativeperennials.com/ and use the code LEIC to assure the Conservancy gets credit for the sale. Over the course of the spring we will be adding an additional 100 species of native perennials so please check in from time to time to see what additional plants have come online.

A delivery day will be set in May for these plants. For those on Middle Bass who wish to order, a pick up on Middle Bass will be set up as well.

nesses open up for the season, we will be welcoming even more island visitors. To avoid a \$50 parking ticket, please be mindful of the parking laws and signs (yellow curbs, no parking areas, no more horizontal parking on the angled parking spaces...etc.

We offer a few alternatives to parking your rig when no spots can be found...

Launch your boat and crew and take your vehicle and trailer back to your lodging destination. Then call a cab and meet up with your crew for a fun day of fishing. Repeat this process when you return after a successful fishing day.


### **ECLIPSE** By Gabriela Kaplan © 2017

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

## Garden Club News From Sheri Murphy, President The PIBGC board has been busy throw



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# The Bass Islands and Passing Issue 2

Ever since the passage of Issue 2 last November that legalized the personal usage of marijuana in the state of Ohio, there has been talk around the island about how the change will affect the island community. Who will be first to have a cannabis shop? How will the police handle smokers on golf carts? Will it be allowed at the pool bars? But these topics pale in light of a recent document leaked from an executive session which included PIB Township Council and Village Trustees and the newly created Ohio Department of Marijuana Resources (ODMR).

Labeled "For Your Eyes Only," the document outlined the plans the ODMR has for the Bass Islands which include South, Middle and North Bass Islands. The leaked document spurred local officials to dig deeper into what they learned, and

what they found reveals a diabolical plan for our beloved islands that only the "mad politicians" in Columbus could come up with.

One island official told the Gazette, "Their plan is one that will drastically change the islands in such a manner that the islands, as we know them, won't be fit for our kids, grandkids and assorted other people. Here is an overview of what has transpired so far and how the plan will evolve in the next few years.

Everyone wondered last year why Hineyman Winery's vineyard lease on North Bass was abruptly canceled last year. It turns out the first step in the state's plan is to turn the Ohio Department of National Resources' (ODNR) 600 acres of old vineyards into massive fields of high-grade marijuana fields. State officials have long been aware that any marijuana issue on the ballot would pass with a large majority. More than twenty years ago after the state

purchased the old Meier's Winery vineyards on the island, state officials secretly sent agents to take soil samples. They soon realized the soil that vineyards thrived on for more than a century was also ideal for growing high-grade varieties of cannabis. Bingo! They got rid of most of the vineyards in anticipation of the day when marijuana would be legalized and the rows of grapes could be transformed into rows and rows of marijuana plants.

If all goes well, the plan calls for marijuana plants to be planted this spring on North Bass. Illegal immigrants will be rounded up to do the planting and tending of the fields. The massive amounts of water needed will be pumped out of the lake and used to irrigate the plants. According to the leaked plan document, the water is so nutrient rich with algae blooms, the marijuana plants will produce three crops every growing season. And once the operation gets going, huge glass hot houses will eventually be built to allow for an additional three crops during the winter season. This takes a lot of electricity for the growing lights, but that problem will also be overcome when wind turbines in the lake around the islands will be built to supply the massive amounts of power

According to our sources, Marijuana fields will soon replace the vineyards on North Bass Island

needed for green house growing lights

You may also recall that the ODNR recently funded the renovation of several old vintner homes and a visitor center to the tune of \$5 million. Once work has been completed, these homes will be transferred to the ODMR to house its workers. The planned visitor center will no longer be a visitor center, but a head shop where visitors can sample and buy the various varieties of grass and pot paraphernalia. An outdoor pavilion will be built to accommodate pot smokers who want to relax and enjoy a joint with a lake view. The center will also be where visitors can rent a golf cart to tour the island and personally inspect the vineyards fields of marijuana plants.

With no ferry service to North Bass, ODMR officials are planning to rebuild the main dock at North Bass so a state-subsidized ferry service can operate for the hordes of potheads expected to journey there to get stoned and wasted, plus provide a means to ship the tons and tons of island grown off to the mainland for processing.

According to a notation in the plan document, when Del Burrs, a seasonal resident on North Bass, heard the details of the plan, he told other island residents about it. At first, they were skeptical, but later relieved to hear the state not only had a plan to revitalize North Bass Island's economy, but that the ODMR also planned to groom the marijuana plants to resemble grape vines as much as possible. At that point, Burrs gave a big green thumbs up and was heard to say, "Thanks to the passage of Issue 2, North Bass will be back on the map!

Over the next few years, plans call for the transformation of the state's properties on Middle and South Bass Islands into marijuana fields. One ODMR official said, "The demand

for island-grown will only increase as the word gets out, and with our new website promoting the benefits of islandgrown, gluten-free weed, revenue is predicted to increase 30% to 40% a year." He went on to say, "The state is planning to buy up all the old vineyard land on Middle and South Bass Islands that it can."

You may or may not like what you've read to this point, but the final straw that made island officials leak the ODMR document in the first place and what this means for the island and its people is heart wrenching; State officials plan to rename North Bass Island "North Grass Island," and as the plan progresses, also rename Middle and South Bass Islands 'Middle Grass" and "South Grass" Islands.

Any hopes of fighting the ODMR's plans are futile as state officials are already planning ways to spend the obscene amount of revenue they'll see coming from the Grass Islands, plus the state has already contracted with Rand McNally and Google Maps to change Bass to Grass for the Lake Erie Islands. Officials are also banking on the fact that what they are doing will not be opposed by the two-thirds of islanders who voted to legalize marijuana last November.

# Pond To Be Filled In

Engineers from the Ottowa County Development Dept. were on the island last summer to review plans for the Lake Erie Islands for the next 50 years. Their report was released in March. Among the items of concern to islanders was the plan to fill in Pinky's Pond (aka Smith's Pond, Terwilliger Pond), South Bass Island's only pond.

According to county officials, filling in the pond would accomplish several things. 1) The current bridge needs to be replaced, and the cost of a new four-lane bridge is not in the highways department's budget; 2) There would no longer be a need for a bridge at the entrance of the pond; 3) Residents around the pond say they are getting older and can't keep chasing kayakers out of it; and 4) A lawn would be safer for their grandchildren than a pond.

One noted marine biologist who lives on the island and commutes to Stone Lab on Gibraltar Island told the Gazette, "Filling in the pond would be a crime, but since there's no specific law against it, what the hey!

Work on filling in the pond is scheduled for 2025. The project will take the better part of three weeks to complete.

If you can't beat 'em, join 'em!

For years Put-in-Bay residents have complained about parents letting their children illegally drive golf carts on Put-in-Bay roads. With all the traffic (golf carts, bikes, buses, semitrucks, cars, electric scooters, etc.) this is a very serious problem. Now thanks to recent legislation members of the PIB Township Council have come up with a solution to the problem.

This summer, there will be a "designated road" where parents can let their kids drive carts safely and legally. After much discussion, Airline Dr. that runs from the old Skyway entrance around the southeast side of Put-in-Bay Airport to the Dog Park was chosen to be the designated "Kids Golf Cart Road."

Airline Dr. offers several benefits which make it the perfect choice .: 1) It's not a heavilytraveled road and a safe most of the time; 2) There is a variety of road conditions such as 45-degree turns, slight bends, straightaways, plus concrete, gravel and asphalt road base materials; 3) Parents can be dropped off at the south end of Airline Dr. and use the beach while they hunt for beach glass and let the kids practice driving; 4) The sheriff deputies are familiar with the area because they have a house there where they live; 6) This will keep kids using golf carts contained in one area and not driving all over the island; and last, but not least 7) Some residents of Airline Dr. are all in favor of the designation according to anonymous sources that can't be verified or revealed.

Both law enforcement officers and the business owners who rent golf carts are very much in favor of the kid-designated area. This is the first time they have agreed on anything. When asked what they liked about the plan, neither group had an answer.

One of the cart rental company owner did issue a statement saying in part, "Seeing a kid driving a cart puts a smile on my face. The kid who drives a cart today will be the adult who rents a cart in 20 years."

If all goes well with the kid-designated cart driving road, the next step is to allow parents to purchase a special temporary driving permit that would allow their kids to drive on all the island roads. Officials say they will have a public hearing on any proposed legislation, but expect to have little opposition to it.

"How long does it take to get an idea for your column?"





# Arbor Day Celebration Friday, April 26th



On Friday, April 26th, at 4 p.m., the 15th Arbor Day Celebration will be held at the Village Arbor Day site adjacent to the Put-in-Bay Post Office.

The Council of the Village of Put-in-Bay has allocated funds for Arbor Day expenses. During the celebration, members of the community will plant a Sugar Maple tree. Maple trees are important as sources of syrup and wood. Maple wood may be used for bowling pins, bowling alley lanes, pool cues, butcher's blocks, furniture and some baseball bats, The Cherokee Indians produced a purple dye from Maple bark and used it to dye cloth. Mr. Maxwell Schrimpf, State Service Forester, will attend the Put-in-Bay Arbor Day Celebration. He will plant a tree in recognition of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources' 75th Anniversary this year. At the urging and determination of Julius Sterling Morton, a newspaper editor, the first Arbor Day Celebration was held on April 10th, 1874, in Nebraska. Today, Arbor Day is a national holiday. Arbor Day is also celebrated throughout the world. The tallest tree in the United States is the "General Sherman," a giant sequoia, located in Sequoia National Park, California. The tree is 275 feet tall. The oldest tree in the United States is a Great Bristlecone pine, located in the White Mountains of California. The tree is over 5,000 years old and is believed to be the oldest living tree in the world. Put-in-Bay, Ohio, has been named a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to the goals and principles of the Arbor Day Foundation: a tree commission, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation. Perry's Longboat Will Ride Again

Perry went on to win the battle, eliminating the British naval presence in Lake Erie.

A replica of Perry's longboat, carefully built to look just like Perry's, is being extensively renovated by volunteers at the Maritime Museum of Sandusky. The boat, 20 feet long, is owned by the Perry Group, a friends' group that supports the work of the Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial in Put-in-Bay. The boat is shown off for tourists at the Perry Memorial during the summer tourist season there. It typically spends the winter at the maritime museum.

A crew of five retirement-age men, sailboat owners and faithful museum volunteers have been busy carrying out a complete overhaul of the 12-year-old boat in the museum's boat workshop.

"We don't even have a name, it's just 'the old guys," said Monty Kaufman, the leader of the volunteers and a member of the museum's board. "We come in once a week to fix things.

The Perry Group, which supports the Perry Memorial and the park service, asked museum director Molly Sampson if the museum could restore the boat.

The old guys" are Kaufman of Sandusky, Phil Spicer of Fremont, Doug Leavens of North Olmsted, Tom Siefke of Blackberry Corners near Genoa in Ottawa County and Jeff Smith of Catawba Island.

To restore the boat, the group took it apart, detaching the oars, the seats and other equipment and leaving only the hull. The boat is getting new paint for the first time in 12 years, and other pieces of the boat also are being restored.

For example, the oars, known as "sweeps," were varnished. But the handles of the oars should not be varnished, as that would make them slippery for the rowers, so the handles got teak oil instead.

Work is expected to be wrapped up in about a week, and the boat will then be hauled by trailer and ferry back to Put-in-Bay.

Perry won what was arguably the most important American victory in the War of 1812. Most of the crew of his flagship, the Lawrence, were killed or wounded in the bloody battle, forcing him to transfer his command so he could keep fighting.

Paintings depict him standing up dramatically in his longboat as he went half a mile from one ship to another during the battle. In reality, he was seated in the rear, trying to avoid being shot by a British sniper, said Kaufman, a retired Lutheran church pastor.

The volunteers are all members of the Sandusky Sail Club. In the fall, they put their boats into storage and concentrate on helping the museum.

The work on the Perry boat replica is only their latest project for the museum.

For example, they worked on the museum's new exhibit, expected to be completed soon, on Perry's Battle of Lake Erie. It will feature a replica of a ship's cannon, pointing

toward the enemy during a key moment of the battle, when the rigging of the two main British ships became entangled, allowing the Americans to pound the ships into submission.

The work by Kaufman's volunteer group is a key asset for the museum, Sampson said.

Their efforts, as well as those of our volunteers across all the museum's programs, are what have secured our continued success as an organization,' Sampson said.

# **Captain...Ahoy!**

As of this writing the current sea temp off PIB is 40.3°F and 41.5°F off of Port Clinton. Water temperature at Put-in-Bay is expected to be a constant 40.3°F over the next 10 days. Waves over the next several days are expected to be 1 to 4 feet on average.

### It's Here, Boating Season 2024

Are you ready? As a reminder, for those mariners venturing out on the water in April, please keep in mind that current water temperatures can mean hypothermia very quickly if you should fall overboard. Please be dressed appropriately and have suitable survival gear similar to the anti-exposure suit that I am wearing in this picture which we are required to use when the water temperature is below 60°F. Wearing a PLB (personal locator beacon) is always a

good idea especially when the water is unusually cold. Below is a chart to help you assess your risk level:

Water Temperature (Fahrenheit)	Exhaustion or Unconsciousness	Expected Time of Survival	
32.5 degrees	Under 15 minutes	Under 15 to 45 minutes	
32.5 to 40 degrees	15 to 30 minutes	30 to 90 minutes

#### How To Use Your Horn...

... and other signaling devices. An area of boating that doesn't get discussed much is the importance of using sounding devices to indicate your intentions while boating. Understanding how to signal other boats of your intentions as well as understanding the intentions of other boats by their audible signals can be a matter of injury or life and death.

Boating in and around Put-in-Bay has become increasingly more crowded (especially during peak months. Record boat sales over the last couple of years and no boater education required for most new boat owners (in the state of Ohio) add a degree of risk in being out on the water. Please familiarize yourself with the proper boating signals.

#### Who Is Required To Use Sound Signal Equipment

Boats less than 39.4 feet in length must carry a sound producing device. This can be a bell, whistle, or air horn or your boat's onboard horn.

Boats 39.4 feet to 65.6 feet in length must carry a whistle and a bell. The whistle must be audible for 1/2 nautical mile.

### **Sound Signals**

Sound signals are referred to as "blasts" and there are two different types of blasts used for warning and steering signals, a "short blast" which lasts one second and a "long blast" which lasts from four to six seconds.

One short blast indicates that I intend to leave you on my port side. When you pass another boat, you will maneuver by leaving them on your left side as you pass. If you are behind a vessel, going the same direction and about to overtake it, "one short" blast indicates that I intend to pass you on your starboard side, my port side."

Two short blasts indicate that I intend to leave you on my starboard side". If you are behind another vessel, going the same direction and about to overtake it, two short blasts indicate that I intend to pass you on your port side, my starboard side."

One prolonged blast indicates that you are departing a dock or slip. It signals that a vessel is getting underway. A prolonged blast is also used when approaching a blind bend.

Three short blasts indicate that you are operating in astern propulsion e.g. backing away from a dock.

One prolonged blast and three short blasts indicate you are getting under way, and that you are backing up (e.g. departing a dock in reverse).

Five short blasts indicates DANGER.

Passing Port to Port. When approaching an oncoming vessel that you wish to pass port to port, give one short blast with your horn. They should respond with a similar blast.

Passing Starboard to Starboard. When approaching an oncoming vessel that you wish to pass on its starboard side, give two short blasts with your horn. They should give the same signal in response.

There are other boating signals beyond these but this is a good start and should be the

most useful in our waters. I know that it is a tall order but if you study and use them we will all be a lot safer for it. Now would be a great time to take a "Safe Boating Class." You can contact the Coast Guard Auxiliary to find out how.







# Kelleys Island/Put-in-Bay Cultural Exchange

The Put-in-Bay Gazette has learned that elected officials from Kelleys Island and Put-in-Bay have been discussing cultural exchange opportunities between the two islands. There's no question that more robust conversations are needed between the two neighboring Lake Erie Islands to preserve their common heritage.

Major Ronnie Herbar of Kelleys Island recently told the Gazette in a taped interview that he was proud to be a member of the Lake Erie Islands community, but was stunned to find out at a recent Lake Erie Islands trivia night contest at the Casino Bar & Grille that he actually knew very little about the other islands. With that, he contacted Major Judy Perry of Put-in-Bay and suggested they indeed start a cultural exchange between the two islands.

After many hours of meetings, the two majors and volunteer committee members from each island came up with a plan that has the two islands trading historic artifacts with each other

Put-in-Bay will send three of the cannons in its downtown park to Kelleys Island for display there, and in exchange Kelleys will send Inscription Rock to Put-in-Bay. The historic "Battle of Lake Erie" cannons from Put-in-Bays downtown lakefront will be placed on the waterfront at the West Bay Inn aiming out to Perry's Monument across the lake. Inscription Rock will be on display at the Bathing Beach by Perry's Monument.

The exchange will last for two tourist seasons before the PIB cannons and Inscription Rock are returned to their rightful islands.

The work of moving the Inscription Rock and the cannons will take place in May. A crane will first lift Inscription Rock onto a large flatbed trailer and then be transported to Put-in-Bay. Once at Put-in-Bay, the huge rock will be properly mounded on a large yet-tobe-constructed planter box. The three cannons will then be removed from DiRevera Park and be transported by the same semi-truck back to Kelleys Island for placement there.

As part of the exchange, Put-in-Bay officials have agreed to restore the weather-worn and faded markings on Inscription Rock. Workers will use battery-powered hand grinders to deepen the petroglyphs and then seal the entire rock with an epoxy mixture that will protect the rock for the next 100 years. Once that work is completed, the PIB Garden Club has agreed to plant and maintain a petunia and tiger lily garden in the planter around the base. Visitors will actually be able to climb a ladder to the top on the rock and see the petroglyphs close up.

Officials on Kelleys Island will have the Perry cannons restored to working order, so they can actually be fired. The bore size of the cannons will be measured and cannonballs machined for some real live-fire demonstrations.

If this first cultural exchange between the islands is a success, you can expect to see more in coming years.

# **Rare Frozen Embryos Found** From "Ole Bill Cantillon"

According to a little noticed Reuters report, a farmer's widow, Wilma Winkle whose farmhouse is located just west of Tiffin, Ohio, discovered a crude working freezer-refrigerator containing some 20 vials of viable embryos. Mrs. Winkle, in her 90s, said most were marked "OP" 1814 and one said "Perry." She said her great grandmother experimented with invitro conception while her husband Wilbur tinkered with crude refrigeration inventions. In a diary kept by her great grandmother, Winkle noted that a local burlesque dancer Tornado Winkle (no relation to Wilma) donated ovum to match with semen of seamen of great lakes shipping vessels.

Wilma speculated from folklore at the time that one or more specimen embryos were from Oliver Perry, famed commodore of the War of 1812. She has elected to sell the surviving embryos at the newly opened Put-in-Bay nursery on Trenton near the Tickle Pop museum during the heavily traveled tourist season in early August to gain the best per embryo pricing. She said "Perry-Winkle" embryos could draw big returns considering the accrued Social Security eligibility of any offspring.

#### Theodore McCann

Theodore W. "Ted" "Digger" McCann, 89 of Put-in-Bay, OH died Monday, February 26th, 2024 at Ohio Veterans Home in Sandusky, OH. He was born April 9th, 1934 in Put-in-Bay, OH to the late William B. and Juanita E. (Phillips) McCann. Ted was a 1952 graduate of Put-in-Bay High School. He then enlisted in the United States Army from January 1955 to January of 1957. On October 15th, 1955 he married the former Joan E. Kindt and she survives. Ted worked for the Miller Ferry for 17 years and rented ice shanties in the winter time. Ted built his own home on Langram Rd. using recycled lumber from the old pony barn that was located where Harbor Square is now located. Back in those days people on the island didn't have a lot of money, and when he found out what it would cost to have his basement dug, he got the nickname "Digger" when he threatened to dig it himself. He ended up getting someone with a backhoe to do it, but the nickname stuck. He did, however, pour the basement walls using stones from the Lime Kiln beach and sand from the shoreline on East Point. He bought the old Doller building from John Nissen where Mossback and the Fishbowl are now located. He owned and operated Ted's Tackle Shop there for 30 years. Ted had was a huge minnow pond in his backyard. During the off season, he would get minnows out of the lake to stock the pond, and in the summer would sell them to fishermen at the shop. After retiring, he made clocks and built furniture, plus walked daily on the island with his wife Joan. Survivors include his wife of 68 years Joan of Put-in-Bay; children: Anita (Paul) Brown of Sandusky, OH, Theodore (Virginia) McCann Jr. of Put-in-Bay, and Kelly (Stanley) Tripp of Springboro, OH; 6 grandchildren; 3 great-grandchildren; and brother Bernard "Mac" McCann of Put-in-Bay. A Mass of Christian Burial will be celebrated at Noon on Friday, April 12th, at Mother of Sorrows Catholic Church where the family will receive friends beginning at 10 a.m. Burial will be in Maple Leaf Cemetery, Put-in-Bay. 

March 4th was the first ferry run of the season, much earlier than previous years and it was a glorious Spring day. The kind that makes you want to sit out in the sun and go ahhhh. The season is starting. And it is great seeing some familiar faces again.

Everyone is talking about the eclipse and every available room on the Island has been rented. The ferry plans on running all day service and most of the Island businesses will be opening early for the daylong event. Traffic everywhere along Ohio's North Shore is expected to be a nightmare, so plan accordingly.

#### COUNCIL NOTES

This was the first meeting since December. Remember, you can attend meetings online on the village website KelleysIsland.us. The Mayor presented his State of the village report, noting that the village finances are all in order and running in the black. There was a sharp increase in Resort Tax receipts for 2023 which, he believes is due to the rise in visitor numbers and the increase in pricing of taxable items. It was a quiet three months.

The KI Police Dept. reported no calls or reports. Their time was spent redoing the inside of the Police Dept. building and hope for an open house later this year. Officer Jack Wade was recognized for his 29 years on the KI police force. EMT's report 8 runs, and 8 clinic calls. They have begun to order items damaged in last year's flood.


The Water Dept. reports that a leak at Dockers has been repaired.

The Park Board was awarded a \$50,000 matching fund grant for the new playground. The equipment has been ordered and site prep should be underway soon. Donations are still needed for items such as fencing, benches and landscaping.

The Village will be advertising for advance preparation of plans for a water treatment plant. Still no details for the public. No legislation was passed as only four of the six Council persons were in attendance.

A special meeting was held on March 18th to wrap up the Emergency issues which included sales of cannabis on the Island. In November, electors in Ohio approved adult use cannabis regulations covering the cultivation, processing, sale, purchase, possession, home grow and adult use by adults over 21 years. The Village has the authority to regulate the sale of cannabis and is prohibiting (in simple terms) sales by a licensed cultivator and processing or dispensing cannabis or marijuana. In addition no property owner shall operate, authorize or permit such operation with the village. This extends to public streets and public properties. 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# Moss on the Rock

### **Grant Recipient**

In the 2024 round of the Parks and Trails Improvement Grant Program, the Put-in-Bay Township Park District, Duff Homestead and Bayfront Preserve was one of the recipients. \$44,336 was received for a new trail for birders and an accessible front porch visitor center station. The Put-in-Bay Township Park District will use some of the money for clean-up, benches, fencing and signage for a birding nature trail from Lakeview Avenue. It also includes safe steps and a handicap accessible ramp at the Visitor Contact Station in the Duff Homestead. The Park District was also the recipient of a \$3,000 Shores and Islands Ohio Destination Development Grant for the Duff Homestead and Bayfront Preserve. This grant will pay for a bicycle rack, an exhibit on mussels and the rest will go toward gravel and grading the entrance and brochure racks at the new Visitor Contact Station at Duff Homestead. This generous support of the preserves is sincerely appreciated.

### **Airport Terminal Timetable**

The PIB Port Authority posted early in March the timetable and details about the demolition of the PIB airport terminal so that a new one can be built. Several residents expressed interest in acquiring various items from the PIB Airport Terminal before demolition. To be fair, the Port Authority opened the terminal to allow inspection of items. That took place from March

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The PIB EMS continues to offer those green address number signs for property owners on the islands. These signs assist all first responders find you quickly in an emergency. There is no charge for island residents, plus if you ever need to call for emergency services, the EMS will want to reach you as quickly as possible. Not having your address clearly marked can delay them in reaching you. They will even install them for you! Just give the PIB EMS a call at (419) 285-2401 to request yours.

### **Deer Collisions**

With the growing population of Whitetail Deer on the Islands, Law Enforcement are anticipating increased chances for Deer/Vehicle collisions. Ohio Revised Code allows the driver of the vehicle involved in a Deer Collision to claim the animal and process the deer with a Deer Slip issued from Law Enforcement in cooperation with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. In the case the driver does not want the animal a list will be established from residents that would like to be called to claim the Deer for processing. The list works on a rotating basis, with the person who has most recently collected a deer being moved to the bottom of the list. If a caller doesn't answer or passes on collecting the animal, dispatch will call the next person in line, and so on until the deer is collected. Anyone on the island is able to sign up to be on the list, To get on the list, please email Deputy Gary Allred of the Ottawa County Sheriff Office at gallred@ottawacountysheriff.org with your name, address and a working phone number to be added to the list. The Established List will be kept for one year and maintained with the Ottawa County Sheriff's Office.

Dave and Kat Holscott cruised around the southern tip of South Africa on their way back to Put-in-Bay for the season.


